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A real "German" car makes a return to Topeka after its first arrival in 1947

CAM member **Marcella Briery** was on the front page of *The Topeka Capital-Journal* on October 17, 2009. The story was about a car Marcella and her late husband, John "Bill" Briery, once owned. It was a 1946 Volkswagen bug Bill and Marcella purchased in Germany after the end of World War II and had shipped to the United States in January 1947. The car is believed to be the first Volkswagen to arrive in Kansas and is one of the oldest in the United States. It arrived before the first Volkswagen was sold within the United States.

Marcella enjoyed a reunion with the car courtesy of its current owner, Mr. Mark Merrill, of northern California, who drove it to Topeka. Merrill owns more than 30 Volkswagens and began restoring this example a couple of years ago. Mr. Roy Schubert, who works full time restoring Merrill's cars, said almost all of its parts are original and have been restored to factory condition. Today, its value is estimated at \$30,000. Bill and Marcella paid \$650 for it 63 years ago.

Another CAM member, **Beattie Dixon**, of Topeka, bought the Volkswagen from the Brierys around 1956. Beattie often worked on the car when the Brierys owned it. He was also a World War II veteran, flying as a turret gunner in Boeing B-17 Flying Fortresses of the Eighth Air Force.

It is not clear how many other owners the car went through before Mark Merrill acquired it. Bill Briery died February 27, 2007, but Merrill corresponded with Bill's and Marcella's daughter, Zona, about the car. He told the Capital-Journal he purposely brought the car to Topeka to learn more about its history and what it was like in Germany after the war. He was also interested in what it was like to drive "Hitler's car" around Topeka after the war.

Marcella told the paper the Volkswagen was certainly dwarfed by American cars and stood out. She said it was not uncommon when they parked the car in public that pranksters would pick it up and move it. She also said because of the origin of the car's makers and the fact

it came from Nazi Germany did not help it blend into the neighborhood.

Bill Briery was in Germany after World War II because he flew the Martin B-26 Marauder with the 596th Bombardment Squadron, 397th Bombardment Group, the famous "Bridge Busters" of the Ninth Air Force. He remained in Germany as part of the occupation forces. Marcella joined him there, one of the first Americans to go over after the war.

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CAM says good-bye to a friend, long-time member and volunteer Dr. Carl Fyler



Combat Air Museum lost another member of the Greatest Generation on November 11, 2009, when **Dr. Carl Fyler** passed away. Carl Flyer had been a long time dentist in Topeka. His obituary read that he passed away on the 11th hour of the 11th day of the 11th month of the year, Veterans Day.

Carl was a B-17 Flying Fortress pilot during World War II serving in the 360th Bombardment Squadron, of the famous 303rd Bombardment Group, Eighth Air Force, in England. He and his crew departed the United States from Bangor, Maine on May 31, 1943, flying the Greenland, Iceland, United Kingdom route. They arrived at Prestwick, Scotland on June 3 and eventually to Molesworth Air Base near Molesworth, Cambridgeshire, England. Carl flew his first combat mission on June 30, 1943.

At this time of the War, strategic daylight bombing missions were flown over France and Germany and other occupied countries with limited fighter escort, particularly into Germany. Carl's eleventh mission was to ball bearing factories at Schweinfurt, Germany. Two hundred and thirty B-17s participated in the raid. Thirtysix planes and over 370 men were lost on this raid.

Between June 30 and November 26, 1943, Carl completed 24 missions. His 25th came on November 29, 1943. Twenty-five missions was the magic number for completing a combat tour and going home. Carl's flying ended on his 25th mission, but not in the way he wanted. After dropping bombs over Bremen, Germany, his B-17 was hit by flak and soon after by Focke Wulf Fw-190 fighters. The bomber was mortally wounded, and word was passed to bail out. Eleven men were on the B-17 that mission. Ten were wounded and seven parachuted from the plane. The other four died of enemy wounds.

Carl and the other six survivors were captured by Germans and spent the rest of the war in German prisons camps, he going to Stalag Luft#1 on the Baltic Sea until liberated by Russian troops on April 30, 1945. He wrote of his World War II experiences and memories in his book <u>Staying Alive</u> that was sold for a number of years in our Gift Shop.

Carl was a member of a number of military associations. Perhaps the one in which he was most active, and most well known in Kansas, was the American Ex-Prisoners of War. He served the Governor of Kansas as a member of the Governor's Veterans Advisory Commission for six years and served eight terms as a national officer of the American Ex-Prisoners of War Veterans organization. He rose to National Junior Vice Commander of that organization. He and his wife, Marguerite, formed the first chapter of the American Ex-POW organization in Kansas, and he served as its commander. Carl worked tirelessly for federal legislation in 1980-81 giving former POWs medical benefits. In 1983, he was instrumental in promoting the free issuance of license plates for former POWs residing in Kansas. This law was enacted by the Kansas Legislature effective January 1, 1984 and resulted in specially designed and marked car

tags for former POWs. Carl served at Topeka's Veterans Administration Medical Center as a POW Veterans Administrative Volunteer Service representative.

Carl became a CAM member in June 1982. As Board Chairman **Gene Howerter** remembers, Carl, the late **Raymond Veesart**, and the late **Joe Higgins**, all former POWs, took an interest in the construction of the POW Barracks Room by **Gene** and the late **Ervin Surritt**. Comments and suggestions became involvement and donations of artifacts by the three. Carl and Raymond would sit by the Barracks Room on weekends, holidays, and special occasions and share their experiences with visitors. The POW information and artifacts on the wall across from the POW Barracks Room were assembled by Carl.

As mentioned earlier, Carl sold copies of his books to the Gift Shop for resale after it was published in 1995. He was a speaker at Membership Luncheons over the years and had book signings during Museum events. He gave his last public address on August 19 of this year, at McCrite Plaza Health Center in Topeka.

One item of unfinished business for Carl was his continuing efforts to get Staff Sergeant Joseph Sawicki awarded the Congressional Medal of Honor. Sawicki was tail gunner on Carl's B-17 when it was shot down. Sgt Sawicki's left arm was severed below the elbow and he had grave injuries to his mid section. He crawled from the tail position to the waist section of the B-17 and found both waist gunners injured and dazed. He snapped chest parachute packs on both men and got the waist door open. Sgt. Sawicki then literally booted both waist gunners out of the plane. They were able to open their chutes and survived as prisoners of war. Sgt. Sawicki never got out of the plane. Carl submitted his first recommendation for the Medal of Honor in 1945, and continued throughout his life to get this medal for Sgt. Sawicki. According to Carl's obituary, family members said they would continue to lobby on Sawicki's behalf.

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Donations in memory of Mr. Daniel Hall benefit the Museum in the form of a wonderful upgrade to our conference room

We did not have a speaker for the October Membership Luncheon. Instead, we showcased a new upgrade to the Conference Room courtesy of the family of **Mr. Daniel Hall**. The upgrade is a Panasonic 54 inch plasma HDTV.

Mr. Daniel Hall, 59, of Iowa City, Iowa, passed away on August 6, 2009. He had fallen at his home and died from the injuries. He was a pilot with an interest in aircraft, aviation and aviation history. He was also a World War II historian. Mr. Hall had visited Combat Air Museum a number of times in the past and was a fan of the Museum. His family chose CAM as a recipient for memorial donations. The family requested that the donations be used for something that would recognize Mr. Hall's interest in education and World War history. Mr. Hall was an educator, as is his wife, **Bonnie**.

The choice of how to use the memorial contributions was not difficult for us. For some time, we had talked about getting a power point projector for the conference room to support our Aviation Education Classes and presentations given during luncheons. This year, **Dave Murray** computerized segments of the Aviation Education Class, but was limited to having students gather around a lap top screen to view the contents. When Seaman High School students have presented History Day projects produced on digital video discs (DVDs), we used a 28 inch diagonal monitor on a roll around stand to show their productions. If the presentation required a power point projector, we had to borrow one.

Gene Howerter and Bonnie Hall began corresponding about the use of the memorial funds. When Mrs. Hall indicated the initial amount of memorial contributions coming to CAM while saying that others would come directly to the Museum, we knew the power point projector was attainable. So, Gene contacted Smith Audio-Visual Inc. of Topeka and asked for their help in choosing a system that would work best for us. Two representatives from Smith Audio-Visual came to the Museum and met with Gene, Dave Murray, and Russ Wiedle. As they listened to what we wanted to do, they suggested we get a big screen television in lieu of a power point projector. They felt the right television would provide more options and present a better picture in the Conference Room than a projector. Further discussion, questions and answers took place. The Smith Audio-Visual folks talked about where permanent connection boxes could be installed and wired in and discussed further the flexibility of a big screen TV that would support Video tape/DVD/Personal Computer hookups.

When the meeting ended the CAM representatives chose to follow Smith Audio-Visual's recommendations and go with a big screen television.

Gene purchased the television through a brotherin-law. Once it arrived at CAM, he, Dave, and Russ installed the 54-inch television in the Conference Room above the serving window. Russ plugged in our DVD/ VHS player, and we successfully ran a VHS tape, then a DVD. Russ then plugged in his lap top and ran a program on the big screen. All this was pretty impressive. Russ, Dave and Gene discussed how and where to wire in the permanent connections for the screen, and Russ began reading what other applications the television could provide.

The big screen was up and running in time for the Membership Luncheon, but the hard wiring was not yet installed. Russ set up his laptop to run a slide show of Museum aircraft as members gathered for the luncheon. The show included a slide explaining the memorial contributions and dedication by the Hall family.

Introductions were made of new members and visitors. **Ralph Knehans** introduced **Pastor Glenn** and **Denise Bitter** as new members. Gene introduced **Gene Wunder**, recently retired from Washburn University, as a new volunteer who will be helping us with a our marketing plan. **Charlotte Higgins** is also a part of the marketing team that includes Gene, Dave Murray and **Dick Trupp. Larry and Diane Todd** introduced their guest, **Mr. Ralph Martin**. Mr. Martin, like Larry, works with wood and was introduced as a fellow "Chipmonger."


Gene spoke about the success of the 5K Run/Walk held in September and his desire to get more participants for future events.

sisters' dad, **Gary**, who was the young person at the Museum. The daughters are the third generation of Naylors to volunteer at CAM.

For a program, a VHS titled *Wings of Glory: The Air Force Story 1903-1953* was shown on the big screen. The video tape covered the period 1930-1935, and its showing gave us a hint of the things we can do with this television.

Since the luncheon, Russ has wired in the connection boxes for the big screen. They are to the lower right of the screen. The television is wired to an antenna for television reception, and Russ has used it as a monitor using his laptop and our wireless Internet connection. This is such a giant step forward in terms of audio-visual capability for the Museum. But, just in case we want to go retro and show a 16mm movie, we kept the movie screen mounted above the television.

Gene mounted a memorial plaque with Daniel Hall's photo on it. The plaque reads:

"Dan was born in Omaha, Nebraska on September 23, 1949. He spent the majority of his childhood in Iowa City, where he graduated from City High in 1967. Dan served in the Marine Corps for two years in Guantanamo Bay, Cuba. Following his service Dan returned to Iowa City. In 1975 he received a B.A. In Spanish from theUniversity of Iowa and on July 5, married Bonnie L. Schnoor. In 1978 he received an Associate's Degree from HawkeyeInstitute of Technology and went on to become an Instructor of Automotive Technology at Kirkwood CCC in Cedar Rapids, IA. During his tenure Kirkwood was twice named one of the top Automotive Programs in the nation by the Automotive Industry Planning Council. Dan's program was part of the T-Ten Toyota Technician Education Network. After teaching for 22 years Dan retired in July 2009. He passed away on August 6, 2009. Dan was a collector, a WWII historian, a comedian, a pilot, a tinkerer, an inspiring teacher and a loyal friend, mentor and neighbor. He loved his wife and two children beyond measure."

Office Staircase

WingJacks

Don Dawson is cleaning and repairing the Museum's wing jacks. He power washed six jacks and will go over each to make any repairs necessary. We decided to renew all hoses on the jacks. Don recently completed one of the 30-ton units. He used the fork lift to raise it off the floor and then removed its three wheels and wheel supports. He cleaned the springs and had to straighten one of the supports. New hoses were installed, and the jack was operated for freedom of movement. For now, this jack is back in its storage area, but Don plans to repaint the unit. A second 30-ton jack is currently in the shop.

F-86H

Bob Crapser removed the instrument panel and consoles panels from the F-86 for a much needed cleaning. The panel is missing three instruments, and Bob is researching the Internet to find replacements. He recently found one we needed. With the panels out of the cockpit, Will Grinstead did a preliminary cleaning of the cockpit and plans to do more detailed cleaning now that he has seen the interior condition. Robert Johnston delivered some work stands in October that will facilitate painting the aircraft. Danny San Romani and Zak Amos are sandblasting, prepping and priming the rails for the wing leading edge slats. They have also spot blasted and prepped corroded fasteners on the top of the right wing, with a lot more to go on both wings and the fuselage. **+ + +**
